Joe Argentino will share his illuminating and humour-filled Tuckamore Talks – both in the flesh and online, and Eastern Owl and Shelley Neville will dazzle on our Late Night series. This strange year has given us an opportunity to question the so-called boundaries of classical chamber music and we've spent extra time really thinking about the music we'll feature. You'll still hear many of your favourite pieces, but we're widening the circle to include other great composers that may be less familiar but so deserve a place at the table. We're also drawing from our rich and talented roster of local players – Heather Kao, Kate Read, Michelle Cheramy, Annie Corrigan, and Young Artist alum Danielle Greene - in some exciting combos. We've also managed to create a viable cohort of Young Artist performers, from here and away, who will share their talents and enthusiasm.

We look forward to welcoming you on the opening night on August 10th with a special Duo Concertante performance called SOLACE - music about reconciliation, peace, understanding, loving and communion. We know the festival as a whole will also be a counterpoint to the worldwide stress and sadness caused by these pandemic times.

It won't be a regular Tuckamore just yet, but we're happy that much of it will be live, even if the audiences need to be smaller. We can't wait to see you this August!

With the benefits of an expanded hybrid format, listeners from across the globe will be able to enjoy online concerts with Mohawk cellist and composer Dawn Avery, and the sensational Georgian pianist Alexander Korsantia. In addition, most live concerts will be recorded and presented online. Let's not forget a pandemic favorite, the popular Alumni All-stars concerts, which will display the talents of astounding alumni from wherever they may be.

Following a year and a half of pandemic times, and the hard truths that we have faced as a society in recent months, we are sure that the Tuckamore Festival's hybrid version of livestreamed and live music will provide consolation and JOY!

Program Notes for Love In the Time of Covid: Iotsistokwaron:ion (2021)

COMPOSED BY DAWN AVERY FOR NANCY DAHN AND TIMOTHY STEEVES WITH LOVE

Commissioned by Duo Concertante, Nancy Dahn and Timothy Steeves with support from Memorial University, Newfoundland/Labrador

The first part of the title refers to the award-winning novel "Love in the Time of Cholera" by Gabriel Garciá Marquez in which the main character seeks to heal his broken heart during a cholera outbreak.

Iotsistokwaron:ion means "the stars" in the Kaniènkéha (Mohawk) language. No matter where we are, in quarantine together or apart, on earth or in heaven, we share the stars. We may share the stars as a constant that decorate the sky with beauty, sparkling as ornaments for the moon. They remind us of our connection to each other and to beauty.

During the time of covid and following, many people have reevaluated their priorities and made changes in their lifestyles. Families lived together again during quarantine, many resumed family dinners and walks, many had to depend on others in new ways due to struggles and grief. Others practiced meditation, new art forms and health practices, explored new topics through watching movies and reading, and many have found a deeper sense of spirituality. Many helped their neighbors through personal contributions, donations, nursing and support. There has been great compassion for those who passed, struggled and suffered.

The work incorporates open voicings and tempi, extended performance techniques that include harmonics, and the Mohawk language as it echoes inside the piano. Along with the positioning of the performers who come together physically and thematically, the sounds are incorporated to evoke the human connectedness that we always have to the cosmos.

Love In the Time of Covid: Iotsistokwaron:ion (2021) is dedicated with love to Duo Concertante's Nancy Dahn and Timothy Steeves. Their work reflects the beauty of relationship to each other, the music, the composer, the audience and the earth and sky upon which they perform as loving gifts to the world.



James Campbell

James Campbell has followed his muse to five television specials, more than 40 recordings, over 30 works commissioned, a Juno Award (Stolen Gems), a Roy Thomson Hall Award, Canada's Artist of the Year, the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal, an Honorary Doctor of Laws, and Canada's highest honor, the Order of Canada. In January 2019, Campbell was inducted in the CBC Classical Music Hall of Fame.

Dubbed "Canada's pre-eminent clarinetist and wind soloist" by the Toronto Star, James Campbell has performed solo and chamber music concerts in more than 35 countries in many of the worlds' great concert halls: London's Wigmore and Queen Elizabeth Halls, Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, Tokyo's Suntory Hall, Paris's Theatre Champs-Elysees, Washington's Kennedy Centre and Boston's Symphony Hall.

Campbell has been soloist with over 60 orchestras, including the Boston Pops, the London Symphony, the London Philharmonic, the Russian Philharmonic, and the Montreal Symphony and has performed Copland's Clarinet Concerto four times with Aaron Copland conducting. He has appeared with over 30 string quartets, including the Amadeus (when he replaced an ailing Benny Goodman on a tour of California), Guarneri, Vermeer, New Zealand, Fine Arts, Allegri and St Lawrence Quartets.

Of Campbell's extensive discography many have won international acclaim. His recording of the Brahms Clarinet Quintet with the Allegri Quartet was voted "Top Choice" by BBC Radio 3 and the London Times and Stolen Gems, a recording of lighter classics, won a Juno Award (Canada's Grammy). James has recorded with the London Symphony (the world premiere recording of Brahms Sonata Op. 120 No. 1 orchestrated by Luciano Berio and Weber Concerto No.1), the Philharmonia (Debussy Premier Rhapsody), the London Philharmonic (Saint-Saens Tarantella), and the NACO (Mozart and Copland Concertos). Sony Classical has recently re-released his recording of the Debussy Premier Rhapsody with Glenn Gould.

Since 1985, James Campbell has been Artistic Director of the Festival of the Sound, the annual summer Canadian chamber music festival, and has programmed over 1300 concerts for the festival. Under his direction the Festival has traveled to England, Japan, and the Netherlands and it has been the subject of documentaries by BBC Television, CBC Television



and TV Ontario. In July 2018, Festival of the Sound produced one of the most important commissions ever attempted, Sounding Thunder: The Song of Francis Pegahmagabow, with the support of the Canada Council of the Arts' New Chapter program.

Campbell is the subject of numerous features and cover stories in Clarinet Magazine (USA), Clarinet and Sax (UK), Piper Magazine (Japan), Gramophone, and in the book Clarinet Virtuosi of Today, by British author and clarinet authority Pamela Weston. He has been Professor of Music at the prestigious Jacobs School of Music, Indiana University since 1988.

James Campbell plays Conn-Selmer clarinets and uses Vandoren and Legere reeds.



Alexander Korsantia

Described Alexander Korsantia is one of the leading pianists of our time. A "major artist" (Miami Herald) and a "quiet maverick" (Daily Telegraph), Alexander Korsantia has been praised for a "piano technique where difficulties simply do not exist" (Calgary Sun).

In recent seasons Mr. Korsantia performed with the Stuttgart Philharmonic, Boston Philharmonic and Xiamen Philharmonic, Israel Symphony and Jerusalem Symphony Orchestra. With The Far Cry Chamber Group he played Galina Ustvolskaya's Piano Concerto in Boston und Tblisi.

Ever since winning the First Prize and Gold Medal at the Artur Rubinstein Piano Master Competition and the First Prize at the Sydney International Piano Competition, Korsantia's career has taken him to many of the world's major concert halls, collaborating with renowned conductors such as Christoph Eschenbach, Gianandrea

Noseda, Valery Gergiev, and Paavo Järvi, with such orchestras as the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, The City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, Mariinsky Orchestra, Orchestra Sinfonica Nazionale della RAI in Turin, Cincinnati Symphony, and Israel Philharmonic Orchestra.

Alexander Korsantia is a frequent guest in many of the world's leading concert series including in Warsaw, Boston, Tel Aviv, Jerusalem, Vancouver, Calgary, San Francisco, Lodz, St. Petersburg, and Blaibach and at major international festivals in Tanglewood and Verbier. A passionate chamber musician, he has collaborated with other leading soloists such as Vadim Repin, Miriam Fried, Kim Kashkashian, Sergei Nakariakov and the Stradivari Quartet.

His award-winning recordings include works by Beethoven, Prokofiev, Rachmaninoff, and Copland. His solo piano transcription of Ravel's La valse was published by Sikorski.

Born in Tbilisi, Alexander Korsantia began his musical studies at an early age with his mother, and later became a pupil of Tengiz Amiredjibi, Georgia's foremost piano instructor. In 1992, he joined the famed piano studio of Alexander Toradze at Indiana University in South Bend, USA. In 1999, then-President Eduard Shevardnadze awarded him the Order of Honor. Mr. Korsantia is a recipient of the Golden Wing award (2015) and Georgia's National State Prize (1997). Korsantia resides in Boston where he is a Professor of Piano at the New England Conservatory.

Dawn Avery

Composer, educator, GRAMMY and NAMA nominated performer Dawn Avery has worked with musical luminaries Luciano Pavarotti, Sting, John Cale, R. Carlos Nakai, Phillip Glass, Charles Wuorinen, Elliott Sharpe, and John Cage. Of Mohawk (Kanien'kè:ha descent, Dawn Avery's Indian name is Ierihò:kwats and she wears the turtle clan. She has collected awards for her own classical compositions from Duke University, the Ford Foundation's Indigenous Knowledge, Expressive Culture grant program (of the American Composers Forum), the Smithsonian's Museum of the American Indian, American Dance Festival, Washington Flute Association, NYU and Meet the Composer, among others. Her music can be heard on radio, television and film including interviews with Native America Calling, NPR, and the CBC.

Her chamber music often employs elements of sacred and world music and has had her music performed in such places as the Smithsonian Museum of the American Indian, North Dakota Contemporary Museum of Art, University of Maryland, Julliard School, Colorado College, Sound Symposium in NLF, Lincoln Center and Kennedy Center. EngleWinds recorded her chamber music in 2008 (Tulpe). Avery is currently completing a recording of the North American Indian Cello Project with compositions by Native composers. She has composed music for award-winning films with Rich/Heape Productions, Miramax, Smithsonian and most recently The Warrior Tradition produced by Hott Films. Avery has also composed for theatre with Spiderwoman Theatre in NYC, the Alliance for New Music-Theatre in Washington DC and Heather Henson's IBEX Puppetry. The latter Indigenous based project led to a run at the New Victory Theatre on Broadway, Aijiaack on Turtle Island (2019), and the release of the album Crane on Earth, in Sky: a Journey (2017) that won two silver medals for best album and bes World Music for theatre by the Global Music Awards. Her latest award-winning multimedia projects and recordings feature what has been called Native downtempo (50 Shades of Red) and World Mystic Pop (Beloved).

Dr. Avery holds a PhD in Ethnomusicology with research on the application of Indigenous Theory to Native Classical Composers and their music in which she created new methodologies to

decolonize traditional research and analysis, and its representation. She is committed to the preservation of language of culture through the production of archival recordings, and her Native Composers Project. Committed to water sustainability and education through the arts, Avery's World Music program was awarded UN Ambassador for their work over a ten-year period performing and arranging water songs and dance from around the word.





Duo Concertante

Nancy Dahn, violin; Timothy Steeves, piano

For over twenty years, violinist Nancy Dahn and pianist Timothy Steeves have built an international career as the acclaimed Canadian chamber ensemble Duo Concertante. Their name comes from the inscription over Beethoven's "Kreutzer" sonata, "in stilo molto concertante," which implies the two performers are equal, dynamic voices. This defines their unique artistic relationship and the "deeply integrated performances that flow naturally as if the music were being created on the spot" (Gramophone).

After their first concert in 1997, the Halifax Chronicle-Herald called them "two packages of musical dynamite that would credit any stage on the planet." Since then, they have performed more than 600 performances around the world, at such prestigious venues as the Wigmore Hall (London), Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall (New York City), Shanghai City Theatre (Shanghai), the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (Los Angeles), Roy Thomson Hall and the Four Seasons Performing Arts Centre (Toronto), the National Arts Centre (Ottawa), and the Forbidden City Concert Hall (Beijing).

Duo Concertante have produced 12 albums, recorded on the Centrediscs, ATMA and Marquis Classics labels, creating a formidable oeuvre of new works and definitive classics. Beethoven: Complete Sonatas for Violin and Piano received critical praise in German, Austrian, British and Canadian media, and was described by Gramophone as "a miracle of...knowledge and poetry." In 2017, J.S. Bach Six Sonatas for Violin and Keyboard was named ECMA's Classical Recording of the Year, the first of three consecutive ECMA wins in that category, followed by Incarnation (2018) and Perfect Light (2019). The just-released Franz Schubert Music for Violin and Piano (May 2020) has already gained attention from the CBC for being "heart-rending...thrilling", and with "uncanny unity of purpose."

Nancy and Tim are stalwart advocates for Canadian composers, and have commissioned, premiered and recorded over 65 new works to date. Composers such as Chan Ka Nin, Kati Agócs, Andrew Staniland, Alice Ping Ho, Randolph Peters, Andrew MacDonald, are just a few of the many distinguished artists they have worked with. It Takes Two (2009), described as "spectacular" by American Record Guide, is a collection of encore pieces arranged by Clifford Crawley, and Wild Honey (2011) featured their commissioned work Duo for Violin and Piano

by R. Murray Schafer, which won a 2011 JUNO Award (Classical Composition of the Year). In 2020, the Duo launched "Ecology of Being," a dynamic program of music and words inspired by climate change and mankind's reliance on the earth not only for survival but for resilience, mental health and spirituality. New works by Melissa Hui, Ian Cusson, Bekah Simms, Dawn Avery, and Carmen Braden reflect on the state of our world and what we may be leaving the next generation through music and poetry.

Duo Concertante are the artistic directors, founders, performers, and mentors of the Tuckamore Festival - an internationally acclaimed chamber musical festival held for two weeks each August. For almost 20 years, Tuckamore -- a major contributor to the cultural life of Newfoundland and Labrador-- has welcomed leading artists and emerging musicians worldwide to St. John's. In addition to featuring extraordinary performances by artists such as Janina Fialkowska, Jon Kimura Parker, the Danish String Quartet, the Miro Quartet, and Louie Lortie, it also offers an inspiring and intensive educational experience for more than 20 young chamber musicians and composers. Duo Concertante also regularly perform and collaborate with other artists of international stature, at other summer music festivals throughout North America, including the Ottawa International Chamber Music Festival, Cactus Pear Music Festival, Toronto Summer Music, Festival of the Sound, Indian River Festival, Domain Forget and Music Niagara.

Throughout their artistic endeavours and achievements, Nancy and Tim have maintained a full studio of students drawn from across North America. Their students have been accepted for graduate studies at the Juilliard School, Rice University, the New England Conservatory, the Royal Academy of Music, the Guildhall School and the Peabody Conservatory. Duo Concertante have given hundreds of master classes and workshops in Canada, the US and China.

Duo Concertante's artistic excellence and contributions throughout their 20-year career have been acknowledged with the receipt of Royal Society of Canada Fellowships, being named University Research Professors by Memorial University of Newfoundland and singled out by the Newfoundland and Labrador Arts Council as Artists of the Year in 2009.

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Heather Tuach

Heather Tuach began her studies at Memorial University of Newfoundland and completed a Doctorate of Music in 2009 at Stony Brook University, New York. She is cellist of Greenwich Trio and Artistic Director of Wintertide Music Festival in Corner Brook as well as Trustee of The Susanne Beer Cello Corner Foundation in the UK, which supports young cellists through instrument loans and more.

Heather was a member of Fitzwilliam String Quartet from 2008 to 2016, until the birth of her son. During her years with the Quartet, Heather performed throughout the UK, including at Wigmore Hall

and Kings Place in London; toured North America, Europe and South Africa; appeared live on BBC Radio 3's 'In Tune'; and was in residence at the University of St Andrews, Scotland, Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge and Bucknell University, Pennsylvania. In 2021 Heather resumed playing with the Fitzwilliam Quartet, with concerts in Aldeburgh and London.

In 2018, Heather joined Greenwich Trio, with violinist Lana Trotovšek and pianist Yoko Misumi. Greenwich Trio performs regularly in London, including at Conway Hall Sunday Concerts and at the Beethoven Piano Society of Europe. The Trio plans to record the complete piano trios of Brahms in 2021.

During the 2020 pandemic year, Heather made a number of video recordings for 'The Cello Corner' YouTube Channel. She is most proud of three commissioned solo cello works: Laude, Stone and Bird, in memory of her father, by composer Marcus Barcham Stevens.

Heather can also be heard on Greenwich Trio: Beethoven Piano Trio Op. 97 (Hedone Records, 2020) and Fitzwilliam Quartet: Bruckner String Quartet and Quintet (Linn Records, 2015), which received 5/5 stars from BBC Music Magazine. Her recording with pianist Patil Harboyan, Music from Armenia for Cello and Piano, has been called 'A delightful disc of discoveries' (Gramophone Magazine). In 2015, the duo performed Music from Armenia at Carnegie Hall, New York.

Patrick Cashin

Described by CBC Radio as "a truly original interpretive voice," pianist Patrick Cashin is becoming known as a distinctive presence on the Canadian music scene. He designs unique recitals centred around the best of the piano repertoire and particularly enjoys playing Mozart piano concertos, where he improvises and composes cadenzas in the style of Mozart. Highlights of his collaborative career include concerts throughout Eastern Canada with Spectrolite Ensemble, numerous appearances at the Tuckamore Festival, and an album of choral works with chamber ensemble by composer Marie Bernard, released by ATMA Classique in 2019.

Having grown up in St. John's, Newfoundland, where it is common for musicians to play in multiple genres, Patrick is able to draw from a wide array of influences. The long list of activities on his resume includes playing double bass for jazz jam sessions, touring as bassist in a rock band, sailing the Pacific Ocean playing in a cruise ship band, playing in pit orchestras for musicals, and short stints as a church organist, percussionist, and bass singer in an award-winning amateur choir. While focusing in recent years on the piano, he remains a musical omnivore, attending live performances in Montreal of everything from the Bach Passions to contemporary jazz and electronic music.

As a student of Timothy Steeves at Memorial University, Patrick won several competitions including the Atlantic Young Artist and Petro-Canada Young Artist Competition, resulting in some early success playing recital tours and concertos with local orchestras. He left Newfoundland to study for two years at the Glenn Gould School in Toronto, then went on to complete a Master's and Doctorate at

l'Université de Montréal under the guidance of legendary piano pedagogue Marc Durand. Patrick wrote his doctoral research paper on improvisation in the Mozart concertos and began integrating his own material into performances, appearing as guest soloist with l'Orchestre philharmonique des musiciens étudiants de Montréal (OPMEM) and the Memorial University Orchestra.

Over the years Patrick has studied in master classes with many brilliant musicians of the older generation including Ferenc Rados, Robert Levin and Leon Fleisher. He works as a collaborative pianist and teacher in Montréal, Québec.





Eastern Owl

Eastern Owl is an Indigenous-led all nations group of women who blend the styles of First Nations Drum Music and Contemporary Folk to create their own innovative sound. Based primarily out of St. John's, NL, the women of Eastern Owl hail from all across Ktaqamkuk (the island of Newfoundland). A powerful ensemble of eight vocalists, they have been captivating audiences across Canada since 2011.



Shelley Neville

Whether in concert, opera, or recital, Shelley Neville enchants audiences with her "1000-watt smile" her sumptuous voice and engaging presence.

Born and raised in St. John's, Newfoundland, Shelley Neville received a conjoint degree of Bachelor of Music in 1993 and Bachelor of Music Education in 1994 from Memorial University. Shelley then continued her education at the University of Toronto where she obtained an Artist Diploma (Honours) in 1996 then went on to complete an Opera Diploma (Honours) in 1999 where she received the Most Distinguished Graduate Award and in the same year was a Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions finalist. In 2007, Shelley received her Master of Music in Vocal Performance and Pedagogy from Memorial University where she is currently instructing voice part-time.

With deep roots in community, Eastern Owl has committed to deepening their connection with their traditional practices while helping to educate Indigenous and non-Indigenous audiences through song. They are the recipients of the 2016 ArtsNL CBC Emerging Artist award, the 2019 Music NL Indigenous Artist of the Year Award and most recently have been named the 2020 ECMA Indigenous Artist of the Year.

They have taken the national stage during Canadian Music Week (ON), Coastal First Nations Dance Festival (BC), and Petapan (NB), as well as festivals in their hometown of St. John's such as Identify, Out of Earshot, Spirit Song, and Newfoundland and Labrador Folk Festival. The women have been making waves following the release of their debut album "Not Quite Like You" in 2016, and are currently celebrating the release of their 2019 sophomore album "Qama'si".

Rarely photographed all together, Eastern Owl is Jenelle Duval, Stacey Howse, Kayla Stride, Danielle Benoit, Natasha Blackwood, Jaime O'Leary, Rebecca Sharr & Joanna Barker.

In 2015, Shelley sang in the Neil Semer Vocal Academy in Cevennes, France as well in 2008 in Aub, Germany. Shelley attended the Centre for Opera in Sulmona, Italy a five-week inaugural training program where she performed the role of Marcellina in Le Nozze di Figaro. Shelley also trained at the Britten Peers School for Advanced Musical Training in Aldeburgh, England.

Local oratorio and opera highlights include Beethoven's Ninth, The Messiah, Haydn's Creation, La Traviata and The Merry Widow with the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Maestro Marc David.

In 1997, Shelley co-founded one of the province's leading theatre companies, Spirit of Newfoundland Productions. Some performance highlights to date include a cross Canada tour in 1997 promoting Newfoundland Tourism, singing for Queen Elizabeth in Bonavista for the Cabot 500 Celebrations, touring the province with the off- Broadway show, I Love you, You're Perfect...Now Change, singing for President George Bush senior in Port Hope Simpson Labrador, playing the title role of Patsy Cline in Just a Closer Walk with Patsy Cline and receiving the adjudicators top favourite prize for Nunsense at the Waterford Light Opera Competition in Waterford, Ireland in 2005.

Shelley is no stranger to the musical theatre scene where she has played comedic and dramatic iconic roles such as Mme. Thenardier in Les Miserables, Bird Woman in Mary Poppins, Rosie in Mamma Mia and most recently Doralee Rhodes in 9 to 5.

In 2008, Shelley established her own performance company and has produced some of the province's most elegant musical shows: Big Italian Night, The Big Wigs and the highly popular annual Christmas favourite Shelley Neville presents O Holy Night under the musical direction of Bill Brennan.

In 2010, Shelley was awarded the Emerging Leaders Award at the National Association of Teachers conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. In 2012, Shelley received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for her outstanding musical contributions made Canadian culture. In 2020, Shelley was delighted to play Doralee in 9 to 5 for Atlantic Light Theatre Company and is a sought after clinician and adjudicator.

Vernon Regehr

A native of Winnipeg, cellist Vernon Regehr is an active recitalist, chamber and orchestral musician, conductor and teacher, and developer of eMusic Bach, an interactive iOS app. Regehr is as member of Memorial University's School of Music and serves as the musical advisor and conductor of the Kittiwake Dance Theatre company.

An avid chamber musician and teacher, he serves as a member of the faculty at the Tuckamore chamber music festival in St. John's Newfoundland he has performed numerous commissioned works for national radio broadcast. He is a founding member of the Spectrolite Ensemble, a clarinet trio with Sean Rice and Patrick Cashin whose premiere recording includes works by Beethoven, Zemlinksy and Roberto Sierra. Regehr served on the performance and teaching faculty of the Kinhaven Music Festival in Vermont for many years, and has taught at numerous other festivals. He has collaborated with Ensemble Made in Canada, the Shanghai, Penderecki, Fitzwilliam and Lafayette string quartets, Andrew Burashko, Mark Fewer, Suzie Leblanc, and Leon Fleisher. His performance of Carter's cello sonata at the Groundswell New Music Festival commemorating Elliott Carter's 100th birthday, "...showed a clear understanding of the work, while handling its hefty technical demands with finesse." (Winnipeg Free Press)

He has made festival appearances with the First Avenue Chamber Players of New York City, at the Indian River Festival, the International Festival of Ensembles in St. Petersburg, Russia, Trindidad Arts Festival, University of Victoria, Artspring, SoundaXis New Music Festival, Hilton Beach, Toronto Summer Music Festival, Music in the Barns and the Chamber Music Societies of Quebec and Kitchener-Waterloo. He has also performed as soloist with the Winnipeg Symphony, Newfoundland Sinfonia, Memorial University Chamber Orchestra and the Cantata Singers of Ottawa.

His first solo album, Full Spectrum, features previously unrecorded Canadian works for unaccompanied cello, includes Lamentations (Clark Ross), which was awarded the 2014 East Coast Music Award for Composition of the Year. John Terauds (Wholenote) writes, "... Regehr executes [Versprechen] with elegant ease, as he does every other one of the very difficult pieces on this album." He recently commissioned and premiered Andrew Staniland's Calamus song cycle with soprano Jane Leibel and is currently collaborating with author and filmmaker Kenneth J. Harvey to reimagine the cycle as a collection of short films. The first of four, Aliment Roots, has been screened at film festivals nationally and internationally, and the final films will be completed later this year.

Recently, Regehr designed eMusic Bach, an iOS App that enables the user to learn and play from J.S Bach's first suite for solo cello using a visually enhanced and interactive score. By selecting menu items, coloured noteheads and multiple staves highlight various elements of musical analysis including harmonic progressions, compositional structure and a composed accompanying bass line. Regehr completed his undergraduate training at the Royal Conservatory of Music in



Toronto, where he studied with Thomas Wiebe, Shauna Rolston and Kim Scholes. He earned both his Masters and Doctoral degrees at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, studying with Timothy Eddy. He was the recipient of the Ina Gordon Fellowship for two seasons at the Tanglewood Music Centre, and also performed at the Taos School of Music, Banff Centre for the Arts, Colorado College Conservatory, and the Oberlin Conservatory Summer Festival in Casalmaggiore, Italy.

While living in New York, Regehr taught cello in East Harlem with the renowned music school Opus 118, featured in the major motion picture Music of the Heart, starring Meryl Streep. He also appeared in Atom Egoyan's film Sarabande, the fourth of six films from the Inspired by Bach series featuring Yo-Yo Ma.

His partner, Amy Henderson, is Artistic Director of Projekt Chamber Voices and Executive Director of Business and Arts NL, and they have two young sons.

Andrew Staniland

Described as a "new music visionary" (National Arts Centre), composer Andrew Staniland has established himself as one of Canada's most important and innovative musical voices. His music is performed and broadcast internationally and has been described by Alex Ross in the New Yorker Magazine as "alternately beautiful and terrifying". Important accolades include 3 Juno nominations, the 2016 Terra Nova Young Innovators Award , the National Grand Prize winner of EVOLUTION (presented in 2009 by CBC Radio 2/Espace Musique and The Banff Centre), and was the recipient of the Karen Keiser Prize in Canadian Music in 2004. As a leading composer of his generation, Andrew has been recognized by election to the Inaugural Cohort of the College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists Royal Society of Canada.

Andrew was an Affiliate Composer to the Toronto Symphony Orchestra (2006-09) and the National Arts Centre Orchestra (2002–04), and has also been in residence at the Centre du Creation Musicale Iannis Xenakis (Paris, 2005). Recent commissioners include the National Arts Centre Orchestra, the Brooklyn Art Song Society, cellist Frances-Marie Uitti, and Les Percussions de Strasbourg. Andrew also performs as a guitarist and with new media (computers and electronics).

Andrew is currently on faculty at Memorial University in St John's Newfoundland, where he founded MEARL (Memorial ElectroAcoustic



Research Lab). At MEARL, Andrew leads a cross-disciplinary research team that has produced the innovative Mune digital instrument: www.munemusic.com

Michelle Cheramy

With playing described as a "...fine blend of artistry and bravura" (Edmonton Journal), flutist Michelle Cheramy is an artist recognized for the beauty of her sound, the fluidity of her playing, and her interpretive skills in repertoire from the 18th to the 21st centuries. One of the few flutists in Canada to hold a full-time university appointment, Michelle is currently professor of music at Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland. From her island base she has appeared in recitals and as soloist with orchestras in Canada, the United States and Russia; she has also been featured in numerous radio broadcasts, including nationally on CBC Radio's Symphony Hall, In Performance, Two New Hours and The Signal. Additionally, invitations to present masterclasses and clinics have taken Michelle across Canada and to many corners of the US. A rare combination of outstanding scholar and performer, Michelle is past winner of the Canadian Concerto Competition, prize-winner in the Montreal Symphony competition, and winner of the National Flute Association's annual research competition for her dissertation on the late work of André Jolivet. She has presented conference papers on topics ranging from the flute music to J.S. Bach to the intersection of music cognition and performance, and has been invited to perform at numerous conventions of the National Flute Association. While her performance work now focuses primarily on solo and chamber projects, past orchestral appointments include second flute/piccolo positions with both the Thunder Bay and Augusta Symphony orchestras.

Michelle holds degrees from the University of British Columbia (B.Mus.), Indiana University (M.M) and Rice University (D.M.A.) where she was a student of Camille Churchfield, Peter Lloyd, and



Leone Buyse. A committed teacher herself, Michelle maintains a diverse studio at Memorial that includes undergraduate and graduate students in a broad variety of degree programs. An active contributor to flute culture in North America, Michelle has served the National Flute Association as competition coordinator and committee chair, and is a current member of the Flutist Quarterly editorial board.

Annie Corrigan

Annie Corrigan is an Adjunct Professor of Oboe at Memorial University and the English horn player for the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra. Annie is a co-founder of The Watershed Ensemble, a chamber ensemble dedicated to bringing new and rarely-performed works to the province.

As an Academic Program Administrator for the School of Music, Annie organizes the School's annual audition cycle and coordinates its Community Outreach Programs.

Prior to moving to Newfoundland in 2016, she served as principal oboe of the Carmel Symphony Orchestra and second oboe in the Columbus Indiana Philharmonic. She also worked as an announcer and producer for Bloomington, Indiana's NPR affiliate WFIU, serving as the daily host of Morning Edition and the producer/host of the weekly program Earth Eats.

Annie is currently completing her Doctorate of Music (Oboe) from Indiana University.



Danielle Greene

Native of St. John's, Newfoundland, Danielle Greene received her Artist Diploma in Performances from the Glenn Gould School of the Royal Conservatory under the tutelage of Barry Shiffman and Erika Raum. Additionally, She holds a BMus (honours) from the University of Toronto, where she studied with Toronto Symphony' Concertmaster, Jonathan Crow, and LA Philharmonic's Principal Violist, Teng Li.

Danielle has served as Concertmaster for numerous orchestras including the National Youth Orchestra of Canada, the Royal Conservatory Orchestra, the Colorado College Symphony Orchestra, and the University of Toronto Symphony Orchestra. She has played under the baton of many world-renowned conductors, including Leon Fleisher, Gabor Takács-Nagy, and Johannes Debus. Danielle has won numerous Concerto Competitions: she played her debut performance of Chausson's Poème with the University of Toronto Symphony Orchestra in 2016, and in 2019, performed Glazunov's Violin Concerto at the Colorado College Summer Institute. Danielle is two-time winner of the Glenn Gould School Chamber Music Competition, granting numerous performances at Koerner Hall, the Canadian Opera Company's noon hour concert series, amongst many more recital venues in Toronto. Additionally, Ms. Greene has performed in masterclasses for many acclaimed artists such as Noah Bendix-Balgley (Concertmaster, Berlin Philharmonic), Joel Smirnoff (President, Cleveland Institute of Music), Benjamin Borman (Concertmaster, Metropolitan Opera Orchestra), and The Juilliard String Quartet, to name a few.



Danielle has participated in numerous international summer festivals such as the National Arts Centre Young Artists program led by Pinchas Zukerman, as well as the St. Lawrence String Quartet Seminar at Stanford University in California. Currently, Ms. Greene is a performer with Lincoln Center Stage, and does regular subbing with Symphony Nova Scotia in Halifax.

Heather Kao

From St. John's, Heather Kao is the concertmaster of the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra and first violinist of the Atlantic String Quartet since 2015. She studied at Memorial University with Dr. Nancy Dahn. She has played in masterclasses for Martin Beaver, Lorand Fenyves, Mark Fewer and Pinchas Zukerman to name a few.

She is a past member of the National Youth Orchestra of Canada, Quintessential Vocal Ensemble, and Lady Cove Women's Choir. Heather has been a guest performer on countless recordings, as well as on TV and radio. She has enjoyed performing in many genres, from pop music with Rod Stewart and Hey Rosetta! to traditional music with Ennis and the Once.

She has played in pit orchestras for many local productions, including White Christmas, Our Divas Do Broadway, West Side Story, Evita, and Annie. In addition to the NSO, Heather teaches with the MUN Chamber Program for Youth, Suzuki Talent Education Program, and in her private studio.



Kate Read

St. John's based violist, Kate Read, is violist of the award winning Atlantic String Quartet and Principal Viola in the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra. She is also violist for Dark by Five, resident ensemble at Gros Morne Summer Music, and Principal viola with Opera on the Avalon.

In 2004 Kate won a position with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, London, England where she was a member for 6 years. Kate also regularly played with the renowned Academy of St Martin-inthe-Fields, London Symphony Orchestra, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and the Philharmonia Orchestra.

In 2011 Kate moved to the north of Norway to play for 2 years with versatile chamber group MiNensemblet, with performances in Norway and internationally.

Kate has been involved with multimedia productions for many years, in the various roles of performer, producer, commissioner and visual designer. Founder and co-producer of multimedia Ensemble Meduse (2004-2008), Kate has also collaborated in productions with Artistic Fraud of Newfoundland, Sound Symposium (NL), Memorial University (NL), Arkora (Canada) and Opera North (UK). Kate is regularly invited to play festivals, concerts and recording sessions.

In demand as a teacher and adjudicator, Kate is sessional Viola professor at Memorial University and runs her own studio.



Emma Fisher

Canadian cellist, Emma Fisher was introduced to the cello at the age of three. Coming from a musical family, she has been surrounded by the sounds of strings her whole life. Her solo debut was in 2010, performing the Haydn Cello Concerto in C Major under the baton of the late Jacques Israelievitch. In 2018, Ms. Fisher performed Strauss' Don Quixote with the Hart House Orchestra. Ms. Fisher has received numerous awards and scholarships, including the first prize at the 2015 Ontario Music Festivals Association at the Provincial level.

Ms. Fisher's chamber music career has taken her to halls such as the Richard Bradshaw Amphitheatre at the Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts, and Koerner Hall at the Royal Conservatory of Music. Ms. Fisher is the cellist of the Formare Piano Quartet which was founded at the Glenn Gould School in 2018. In their first year together, the Formare Quartet was awarded Second Prize in the 2019 Glenn Gould School Chamber Music Competition performing Gabriel Fauré's Piano Quartet No. 1 in C Minor, Opus. 15. Ms. Fisher is an avid lover of contemporary music. During the summer of 2019, Ms. Fisher was selected to play in a piano trio and premier a Canadian work, In Lucem Omnia Vana in St. Johns, Newfoundland. Ms. Fisher has taken part of festivals such as The Banff Centre, Tuckamore Festival and Indiana University Summer String Academy where she worked closely with Susan Moses and Csaba Onczay. In 2020, she was selected as a Fellow for the Bowdoin



International Music Festival. Ms Fisher has worked with and played in masterclasses for artists David Geringas, Ralph Kirshbaum, Alisa Weilerstein and Kee-Hyun Kim of the Parker Quartet.

Ms. Fisher studied in the Phil and Eli Taylor Academy at the Royal Conservatory of Music. She later worked under the guidance of Hans Jørgen Jensen and Andrés Dìaz. Currently, Ms. Fisher is working under the guidance of Paul Katz at the New England Conservatory. Ms. Fisher plays on a Caussin-school, French cello made in 1762.

Adam Gravelle

Canadian pianist, Adam Gravelle, has concertized throughout the United States, Canada, Germany, Vienna, Prague, Scotland, and Slovenia. Born in North Bay Ontario, he began to play by ear and improvise on the piano at an early age. He holds an advanced diploma in piano performance from Cambrian College, a BM degree from Memorial University and a MM degree from Rowan University in New Jersey. His primary teachers include Dr. Charlene Biggs, Timothy Steeves, and Veda Zuponcic.

Adam's active participation in both chamber music festivals and piano masterclasses has lead him to working with some of the finest musicians of today such as Louie Lortie, Marc-Andre Hamelin, Larissa Dedova, Richard Raymond, Robert Silverman, and Gilbert Kalish.

Mr. Gravelle currently has a teaching studio in Orange County, where he strives to instill in each student: enthusiasm in a love of learning and of music. He has produced many award winning students, and has recently had students successfully audition into the Orange County High School of the Arts (OCHSA).



Adrian Irvine

Adrian Irvine works as a freelance violinist, music producer, and violin instructor in Toronto, Canada and surrounding areas. He received his Masters in Violin from the University of Toronto where he studied with Erika Raum and performed as Concertmaster with the U of T Symphony and Opera Orchestras in select programs. As a member of the Aeris String Quartet, he was a recipient of the U of T Felix Galimir Award for Chamber Music in 2018.

Adrian's undergraduate studies in violin took place at the Memorial University of Newfoundland with Dr. Nancy Dahn. While at MUN, he received a minor in composition for his studies with Dr. Andrew Staniland and Dr. Clark Ross. His time at Memorial sparked a keen interest in contemporary classical and popular musics from both performance and production perspectives.

Prior to the COVID-19 lockdowns, Adrian performed regularly with ensembles throughout southern Ontario including the National Academy Orchestra, the Mandle Philharmonic, the Niagara Symphony Orchestra, and the Freesound Ensemble, amongst others. He can be heard on recordings for Centre Disks, Universal Music Mena, and Paper Bag Records along with releases from independent artists spanning genres from hip-hop to folk. In 2018 the premiere recording of Bekah Simm's Granitic, on which Adrian played violin, was nominated for a JUNO award.

Ms. Press is currently Second Assistant Concertmaster of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and teaches privately at the VSO School of Music. She is a regular performer in the VSO Chamber Players, Vancouver Chamber Players, and Vetta Chamber music Series.

In the summer of 2020, Emma will be cellist of the Orford New Music Ensemble at the Centre d'Arts Orford in Quebec. As an advocate for contemporary music, she has worked closely with composers Joan Tower, George Tsontakis, John Corigliano, Ana Sokolovic, and Susan Botti, and has performed with the Da Capo Chamber Players, Fifth House Ensemble, Against the Grain Theatre Company, Novarumori Ensemble, and the Contemporaneous New Music Ensemble in multiple world premieres.

As guest soloist Emma has performed with the Woodstock Chamber Orchestra, Bergen Philharmonic, and Bravura Philharmonic. She has performed in masterclasses for Colin Carr, Raphael Wallfisch, David Geringas, Leon Fleisher, and Arnold Steinhardt, among others. As a chamber musician, she has been mentored by artists including Ida Kavafian, Levon Chilingirian, Daniel Phillips, Steven Dann, Barry Shiffman, Duo Concertante, the Gryphon Trio, and the Shanghai Quartet. Emma has been a visiting artist at The Banff Centre and the Centre d'Arts Orford, and has attended the Tuckamore Chamber Music, Domaine Forget de Charlevoix Chamber Music, Vermont Mozart, Atlantic, Heifetz, Round Top, Bowdoin, and Summit festivals, the Fresh Inc. As a chamber and orchestral musician, she is cellist and co-founder of Duo Caprice, is a core member of OrchestraOne NYC, and has performed as cellist in the American Symphony Orchestra, the Vermont Symphony Orchestra, the Opera Company of Middlebury Orchestra, the Opera Italiana Symphony Orchestra, the Pronto Musica Chamber Orchestra,

His current research interests include the connection between form and text in Arnold Schoenberg's religious works, the pedagogical study of improvisation at the keyboard and the late works of Franz Liszt. Dr. Argentino is also involved in interdisciplinary research investigating parallels between musical and linguistic structure with a focus on serial music and language games.

Dr. Argentino is a sought-after speaker and has been invited to give numerous guest talks, lectures, and keynote addresses across Canada. He has presented papers at regional, national, and international conferences, including the Society for Music Theory, the Music Theory Society of New York State, KeeleMAC, Canadian University Music Society, West Coast Conference of Music Theory and Analysis, the Annual Meeting of Music Theory Southeast, and the New England Conference of Music Theory. He has published articles in Intégral, Music Theory Online, Music Analysis, Music Theory Spectrum, Journal of New Music Research, and has recently published a book chapter in The Routledge Companion to Music Theory Pedagogy. Argentino is a dedicated and enthusiastic teacher and was the winner of the prestigious McMaster Students Union Excellence in Teaching Award in the Humanities at McMaster University in 2013.



Jennifer Johnson

Jennifer Johnson played as second violin of the Atlantic String Quartet and principal second violinist of the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra from 1993-2004.

After a playing-related injury in 2004, Jennifer studied the Alexander Technique and trained and licensed in Body Mapping with Founder Barbara Conable.

Jennifer now gives workshops internationally, teaching musicians to move according to the design of their bodies to address and prevent playing injuries. She has been on faculty of the New York Philharmonic's Zarin Mehta Program and has presented Body Mapping workshops to orchestras and festivals, conferences and music schools including the The Finnish National Opera and The Tuckamore Chamber Music Festival. She was a keynote speaker at the Australian String Teachers' Association 2015 Conference. Jennifer was a guest of Juilliard's Noa Kageyama and Carol Rodland on the Bulletproof Musician podcast in October 2019. Jennifer teaches ongoing workshops and lessons at Memorial University of Newfoundland, maintains an active private studio and performs regularly.

Jennifer has written three books on Body Mapping: What Every Violinist Needs to Know about the Body; Teaching Body Mapping to Children and Musician, Heal Thyself. Her books have been translated into French, Spanish and Japanese.

Based in Montreal, Quebec, **Jérôme Chiasson** began his violin studies at the age of four. From 2010 to 2020, he studied at the Conservatory of Music in Québec City with Julie Cossette. The Young Artist Composers

Kirsten L. Ewart is an emerging Canadian composer from Moose Jaw, SK and currently resides in Vancouver, BC. Her most recent works include "How are you handling this?" a solo percussion piece written for Matt Evans, as well as works for the NYU Contemporary Ensemble, Two-Way Street and Bearthoven. Kirsten's music is often a dreamy or surreal reflection of the world. She enjoys engaging her audience in aural adventures that trigger the imagination and memory. In 2020 she had a work premiered by the Jack Quartet, and completed pieces for Hypercube Ensemble and the Piano Erhu Project. Her first orchestral work "Cueva de Villa Luz" was premiered by the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra at their New Music Festival in January of 2019. The piece was well received by the audience and was described as "iridescent and earthy" (Critipeg). Kirsten's 2018 string quartet "Warmth" is her most popular piece, having been performed most recently by the Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra. An advocate for collaboration with her peers, Kirsten has written solo works for Lindsey Rosenberg, Yaz Lancaster and Mikyla Jensen. Kirsten has recently completed her Masters Degree at NYU Steinhardt where she studied with Michael Gordon, Julie Wolfe and Shelley Washington.

Athena Loredo is a composer based in Vancouver, BC. Her compositional style is influenced by the manipulation of musical fragments. These fragments can be original material or quoted from pre-existing works. From quoting fragments of Bach, Prokofiev, and Dvorak in a symphonic poem to creating variations on a Mexican folk song, Athena enjoys exploring combinations of timbres and melodic fragments, reworking music to create something new. Her wind band piece, Variaciones sobre la Llorona, was the firstplace winner of the 2018 GCB Terra Nova Competition in the Arrangements Category. In 2020, Athena's musical interpretation of Olivia Whetung's beaded score, Strata, was featured in the UBC Belkin Art Gallery event, Soundings: Olivia Whetung and the Ladner Clock Tower Carillon. Athena graduated in 2021 with a MMus in composition from the University of British Columbia. She grew up in St. John's, NL, and obtained a B. Mus from Memorial University of Newfoundland.

As an award-winning composer, Hsiu-Ping (Patrick) Wu is constantly searching for new sounds to include into his musical language; his music ranges from the style of neo-romanticism to avantgarde soundscapes, fusing theatrical elements and improvisational techniques. Patrick enjoys composing orchestral works, chamber music, and improvisation. In 2016, he wrote, directed, and scored his first short film Voyages, during the Nocturne: Art at Night Festival in Canada, accompanied with a live orchestral improvising the film score during the performance. Patrick's pieces has also been premiered at Open Waters Festival in Canada, highSCORE Composition Festival in Italy, Zodiac Music Festival & Academy in France, Uzmah Upbeat Composition Program in Croatia, and Atlantic Music Festival in the United States. Patrick has worked with renowned composers such as Jérôme Blais, Dinuk Wijeratne, David Ludwig, Andrew List, Joel Hoffman, Amy Beth Kirsten, and Vivian Fung. 
